

## YORK RIVER

- –13-mile mostly tidal river, beginning at outlet of York Pond, flowing to York Harbor and the Gulf of Maine
- -Productive estuary, healthy marshes
- Early colonial settlement, diverse and well-preserved historic sites

Ecological, cultural, and economic importance

## YORK RIVER WATERSHED

- -33 square miles in 4 towns
- -110 miles of rivers and streams
- -50% land area in large undeveloped habitat blocks; 27% permanently conserved or water supply lands
- Population ~7,200, fast growing area
   Diverse habitats, many community values



#### Diverse species and habitats

-Greatest concentration of endangered and threatened species in Maine

- Part of largest coastal forest area between
   Acadia and Pine Barrens
- -Includes 2 State Ecological Focus Areas



#### Regional water supply

-Over 900 million gallons per year -Serves Kittery, Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, and parts of Eliot and York






#### Archaeology sites

23 prehistoric and 94 historic period sites

-5,000 year old projectile point (2017 survey)

–Earliest colonial tidal mill dam (1634) and 17<sup>th</sup> century homesteads


-Punkintown area—suitable for archaeological district nomination to National Register



#### Salt marsh & estuary

-500 acres salt marsh
-Used by 23 different fish species
-2,500 acres tidal wading bird

-2,500 acres tidal wading bird and waterfowl habitat




# Climate change resilience

- -Healthy salt marshes, natural stream buffers, and good water quality conditions enhance resiliency
- -Space for marsh migration with sea level rise
- -Unfragmented landscape supports wildlife movement



## Historic places

- –8 sites listed in National Register of Historic Places, such as John Hancock Warehouse, McIntire Garrison, and Frost Garrison, plus National Register Historic District
- -3 local historic districts with 76 historic properties
- -Sewall's Bridge, a historic civil engineering landmark

## Working waterfront

- –Public and private infrastructure supports 30-35 commercial fishing boats, plus recreational access
- Landings ~\$3.5 to \$4 million per year
- First in nation working waterfront conservation easement for fishermen and land trust
